## **UK Chapter Celebrates 50 Years in 2022**

As mentioned in the April newsletter, the UK Chapter is 50 years of age this year, so to mark this occasion we are now in the process of arranging a  $50^{th}$  Anniversary Dinner in celebration. It is now confirmed the dinner will be held on the evening of Friday 4 November 2022 at the International Bomber Command Centre (IBCC) Lincoln, which is situated on the southern approach to the city of Lincoln. Thanks to a very large contribution from Chapter funds, the dinner, including a welcome drink, wine and port, a visit to the IBCC exhibition, will be available to members and partners for the amazing price of £25 each. There is plenty of hotel accommodation in the area and lots of interesting places to visit should anyone wish to make a full weekend of it. Please consider joining us at this very special event marking an important milestone in the history of the AOC UK Chapter. The following story was also featured in the previous April newsletter but provided once more to inspire members to consider joining us at our 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary dinner.

#### Early Days of the UK Chapter by Wg Cdr Roger Hannaford – UK Chapter Secretary

The UK Chapter, of what was then the Association of Old Crows, was formed in the summer of 1972, led by Americans working in the UK. Key instigators were Lt Col Stanley Marker, USAF, who had retired in the UK and was a representative for a US EW company (I think Raytheon), Maj Roger Cyganek, USAF, who was an exchange officer on the EW Studies Team at HQ 90 (Signals) Group at RAF Medmenham, and Maj Roger Hermeling, USAF, who was the EWO at HQ 3rd Air Force, Ruislip. Founder members included Wg Cdr Mike Thurbon (EW Studies Team) and me (Ops EW, looking after the EW Canberras), also from HQ 90 Gp. From a transatlantic misinterpretation of the traditional English crimson hunting clothes (which are called 'pink' after the name of the tailor that made them), the Chapter was originally called 'The Red Coat Roost', and the logo showed a huntsman.

Although new members did join, the Chapter probably was not too active by the late 70s and was re-launched by senior officers from MOD. In about 78/79, when I was the EWO at HQ 1 Group, I received two letters in the same week. One was from the Gp Capt head of RAF Police at HQ Strike Command, not knowing that I was also a Crow. It said that



the AOC was a security risk and that we should not be associated with it. The other was from the Ministry of Defence, I think from the Air Commodore Director Air Offensive, saying that we really should get the Old Crows up and running again for all the invaluable interchange of information it offered, to promote EW awareness etc. I phoned to ask the policeman concerned whether he wanted to take this up with the one star. Ah, well, he said, just be careful not to let out secrets. And so, his letter stayed on file. The plod's concerns were finally put to rest when, a couple of years later, the Commander-in-Chief himself hosted a classified UK Chapter visit to HQ Strike Command, since when the Chapter has gone from strength to strength.

After Medmenham, I had been posted to Cyprus and then Lincolnshire and Germany and was unable to be much involved. I did keep up my membership which, in the days before credit cards, meant finding a tame American every year, giving him the 5 US\$ or equivalent and getting him to write a cheque for me to send. Mike Thurbon, however, was very active and was considered the dean of the Chapter, although he joined a little after me. Stanley Marker died in 1990 but, for some years afterwards, the Chapter held an annual dinner in his memory – a fitting tribute to the man who got us going.

## A Chinese Spy Ship Makes First Appearance Near Australian Submarine Communications Base

While the war in Ukraine continues to make headlines, it is clear the tense strategic situation *vis-à-vis* the People' Republic of China (PRC) is not diminishing. As this article in *The War Zone* illustrates, the People's Liberation Army Navy (PLAN) is adopting an increasingly muscular posture in the Asia-Pacific. This includes the deployment of Signals Intelligence (SIGINT) ships close to Australia's coastline. The PLAN is canny enough to remain in international waters during its intelligence gathering activities. Nonetheless, this does not make the deployment of such vessels in proximity to a US ally like Australia any less worrying.

#### **US Navy Looks to Electronic Warfare and Cyber to Enhance Ship Defences**

The loss of the Russian Navy's 'Atlant' class cruiser *Moskva* to Ukrainian Anti-Ship Missiles (AShM) on 14th April has refocused attention on the threat posed to large surface combatants by such weapons. An article in *The National Interest* detailed the steps the US Navy is taking to enhance ship protection. Alongside traditional electronic warfare capabilities, cyber and directed energy effects are in the offing. Efforts like the Naval



Integrated Fire Control-Counter Air programme are taking an innovative approach. NIFC-CA, which has been introduced into naval service, integrates several onboard and offboard sensors to improve AShM protection.

#### How AI would - and wouldn't - factor into a US-Chinese War

The US Department of Defence will receive a new Artificial Intelligence (AI) strategy by the end of the summer. This is particularly relevant given the tense relationship existing between the United States and the PRC. An article on the *warontherocks.com* website looks at the influence of AI in Chinese and US military doctrines, and the importance it could play in any future conflict. The piece examines not only how the People's Liberation Army might use AI during a war, but also before hostilities. What is particularly noteworthy is the depth and breadth of Chinese strategic AI discussion in open sources. Is this perhaps a tacit means of warning the US and her allies of Chinese AI capabilities?

#### **Explained: How Starlink Prevented Russian Electromagnetic Attack In Ukraine**

In late April the Starlink satellite-based wideband internet service operating in Ukraine suffered a cyberattack believed to have been launched by Russian hackers. Space-X, which owns the Starlink service, had sent scores of its terminals to Ukraine following Russia's invasion on 24th February. The move was intended to ensure the Ukrainian population and military retained internet access despite the hostilities. Russia's move was clearly an attempt to deprive the country of internet coverage, yet the move was, by and large, unsuccessful. Starlink was able to devise and rapidly disseminate a software patch which greatly reduced the attack's effectiveness. The rapidity of the response earned SpaceX plaudits from the US Department of Defence.

#### Opinion - Russia is losing on the electronic battlefield

A consensus is emerging that the Russian Army's electronic warfare capabilities are underperforming in its ongoing combat operations in Ukraine. The exact reasons as to why this maybe the case is, as yet, unknown. Nonetheless, deficiencies in the quality of EW equipment maybe a factor, alongside training shortcomings, inadequate doctrine and difficulties in integrating army EW with the wider manoeuvre force. David Ignatius' article in *The Washington Post* provides a succinct summary of Russian Army EW failings so far and what these might mean for the rest of the conflict.

#### Don't Believe the Hype

Staying about Ukraine, the spotlight has fallen on several distinct EW systems the Russian Army has deployed into the theatre of operations. These include the force's Repellent-1 counter uninhabited aerial vehicles system. Using MASS' BattleEye EW Mission Support Tool it is possible to simulate the performance of the Repellent-1 based on system specifications available in the public domain. The result is that the Repellent-1 appears to fall short of its advertised capabilities. This inevitably invites the question as to which other Russian EW systems may have overblown capabilities?
